Required texts (via Moodle): Required Book. Grandes, Almudena. *El corazón helado* (The Frozen Heart), Madrid, 2012. Other readings and articles will be available in class.

COURSE DESCRIPTION (3 credits):

Open to students of the university, this course takes students to Madrid and Barcelona, in Spain to explore the important role of social movements in the development of Spanish identity.

This course offers an approach to social movements in Spain in the 20th century, which focuses on the 2nd Republic, the Franco Era, and the transition to democracy. The course is presented in Spanish and examines campaigns for women's suffrage, the battle for LGBTQ rights, social and political revolutions during the Spanish Civil war, survival in Franco's concentration camps, the response of cinema and literature to Francoist repression, Partisans (maquis), underground political and trade union movements, the awakening of student awareness, responses to capital punishment, protest songs, peace movements during the Transition Period, Cultural Movements in the 80s (La Movida), ecology, and the 15-M social movement.

COURSE PREREQUISITE:

Students from Adelphi must have completed Spanish 231 and 252 or their equivalent to participate in the program. Students need to demonstrate that they have ability to understand and communicate in Spanish. The chair of the Department of Languages, Literatures and Cultures, in consultation with the appropriate faculty will have the final decision on all applicants.

The course is open to majors and non-majors.

COURSE LEARNING GOALS:

Students will learn about the evolution of social movements in Spain from the 20th century to the present day.

Students will examine this period through critical reading of significant sections of novels and scholarly articles, by watching documentaries and movies, and by spending one week in Spain visiting museums, universities, and other sites of cultural significance in Madrid and Barcelona.

OBJECTIVES:

Students will engage in analysis and discussion of thematic developments of social movements in Spain. This course presents a historical description of social movements in Spain from medieval times to the present day. In this course students will explore several aspects of literary composition by the most important authors who were part of a variety of social movements in Spain. All literary genres will be studied including poetry, narrative fiction, essay and drama.

The course will include feminist theoretical readings that pose questions about definitions of gender which will require students to use analytical and interpretive skills for their readings. Students will be asked to articulate their own responses to the readings and to reflect critically upon these responses:

• To have an overview of social movements in Spain throughout the 20th and 21st centuries, as seen through the development of the trajectories of social movements.

- To examine the different strategies employed by the agents of the social movements.
- To develop critical skills through reading and writing.

The students will be introduced to different genres to explore:

1. The content of the work of literature and visual culture related to social movements for both its literal and figurative meanings.

2. The structure of each literary selection.

3. The reevaluation of the role of specific social movements in the evolution of Spanish politics, history, culture, literature and literary criticism.

MOODLE:

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Attendance is required and important to enable your completion of assignments, which involves in class dialogue and activities. You must attend all of the scheduled classes, at Adelphi and in Spain to receive full credit.

EXPECTATIONS:

At Adelphi University: From January 23th to May 17th

You are expected to have read and watched the materials assigned BEFORE our class meetings. You are expected to participate in class discussions with questions and comments on the assigned readings. All discussions in class will be conducted entirely in Spanish.

In Spain: From March 8th to March 17th

Every morning the group will meet to discuss the most relevant topics for the day. Each student needs to have prepared questions, articulate opinions about the articles, and they need to have watched the video assignments before we meet. After every activity, conference, workshop or other cultural activity, students must complete the required assignment.

REQUIRED ASSIGNMENTS:

Students will be assigned readings, and are required to watch short selections of videos for each topic. Students must prepare for every class at Adelphi, and for each day's activity in Spain, having taken notes on the assigned readings and video selections.

FINAL PROJECT & FINAL MEETING AT ADELPHI UNIVERSITY:

The Final Project is a paper (maximum 5 pages) that connects themes from the required readings with one of the main topics of the course.

The final exam is about the experience of traveling and being immersed in Spanish culture while learning about social movements.
