#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

The purpose of this one credit course is to explore the culture, socio-economic, and healthcare policies of the Costa Rica through the experiential learning process in this country through the partnership with a humanitarian organization that provides opportunities with local school, community clinics and hospitals.

Pre-experience meeting will prepare students for community and service based activities. Post-experience meeting, inclusive of debriefings while in Costa Rica will allow students an opportunity to reflect upon, evaluate and share experiences.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the interplay among culture, socio-economic issues and healthcare as observed during the student experience in Costa Rica.
- 2. Identify ways in which their awareness of social responsibilities has increased.
- 3. Describe specific skills that are important in the context of this global experience.
- 4. Describe the impact of this service-based experience on their personal and professional growth.

#### **TEACHING METHODS:**

Discussion, reading assignments, and active participation in the Costa Rica volunteer experience.

#### **METHODS OF EVALUATION:**

- Class attendance, Moodle Forum Discussion, and participation
- Participation in Costa Rica experience
- Participation in all on site teaching projects

#### **COURSE ACTIVITIES OUTLINE:**

# **Pre-experience Classes:**

Discussion of Costa Rica's culture, socio-economic conditions and health care. Students must complete reading assignments and participate in discussions. During this stage, students will be evaluated on attendance, preparation and participation in class.

## **Participation in Costa Rica Experience:**

Student must attend all site experiences, all projects and meetings. Student will complete an onsite Teaching Assignment. During this stage, students will be evaluated on attendance, preparation and participation in activities and assignments.

## Post-Costa Rica Experience/Return:

Students must participate in a follow up class, during which they will demonstrate thoughtful and reflective discussion of their experiences in Costa Rica. During this stage, students will be evaluated on attendance, preparation and participation in class.

<u>Professors Notes:</u> The team activities will be completed by incorporating student inquiry and student-led objectives into the final product. The topics are selected based on the objectives of the service learning syllabus aligned with the humanitarian organization that we are working with in Costa Rica.

The aim of having students play the primary role of helping to develop their own learning opportunities, objectives and goals, are that the professors leading this trip values the students inquisitiveness and development, but strongly believe that it is in the students best interest that they are at the center of their investigation and discovery, while creating habits that will foster and stimulate their continued growth. Ultimately, we seek to generate more engaged student who are willing to serve society while continuing to be at the center of developing their future.

# **Costa Rica Group Teaching Assignments**

Assignments = 30%

Students will work in groups of three to prepare and present a Teaching Assignment from the list below. Teaching Assignments and accompanying teams will be randomly selected.

## 1) Costa Rican Healthcare Juxtaposed: From Clinic to Medical Tourism

Work with your group to research the various healthcare institutions that you will be visiting while in Costa Rica. They include a clinic, a public hospital, and a medical tourism hospital. Compare and contrast the various levels of the health system, while being cognizant of the realities of the local environment and culture

#### 2. The WHO Sustainable Development Goals: Sustainable Practices and Farming

Work with your group to research the WHO Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) and be prepared to discuss the goals including the various challenges faced by the people of Costa Rica, specifically La Carpio in their reality. What are some of the realities that they currently face and what are some opportunities that are available to future generations? Consider the challenges that will be faced by the people in La Carpio and Costa Rica, as a whole prior to 2030.

# 3. Exercise Program for the Children and the use of Dance as a method to spread the message of health.

Work with your group to research the link among exercise, health and wellbeing. Consider dance as a method of self-expression but also as a form of activity that can be utilized to bring communities together. Consider the challenges of the La Carpio people and how they might be able to practically include dance as an activity in their daily lives.

## 4. Nutrition needs of the community linked to a cooking activity for families

Work with your group to research the link between foods for nutrition versus cooking as an activity. Explore how to prepare and eat healthy meal within the context of limited resources and cultural preferences of the local population. Consider an appropriate menu for the population and be prepare to assist with cooking and serving a meal.

## 5. Indigenous Indians, protection, human rights and their future: Is it sustainable?

Work with your group to explore the challenges of the indigenous Indians of Costa Rica in preparation for the trip to visit the Cabecar Indians. Research their rights as a people and the challenges that they face as it relates to tourism, technology, and health. What does their future hold?
