Adelphi in Florence: Experiencing the Renaissance Adelphi University: Summer 2018 May 27-June 15, 2018

Experiencing the Renaissance is an intensive, three-week course in the art, history, and culture of Renaissance Florence. Each day will include a site visit to churches, museum, and cultural landmarks to study the art and history of the Italian Renaissance first hand. We will never be confined to a classroom, as the key to experiencing Florence is walking every inch of the city and discovering the art treasures around every corner.

Students will benefit from the unique experience of having constant access to the expertise of three faculty members: a painter, a sculptor and expert in Florentine history and sculptural practice, and a Renaissance art historian. Students will gain a deep understanding of all aspects of artistic practice and the context of the works of art through lectures and discussion in front of the works themselves, as well as through close observation in the context of on site drawing sessions.

Day 2: Medieval and Dominican Origins of the city

Morning site visit: San Miniato al Monte An introduction to the dawn of the Renaissance in Florence and a fantastic panoramic view of the city. Afternoon site visit: Santa Maria Novella Optional visit and shopping trip to the Farmacia di Santa Maria Novella, founded in 1221 by the Dominican Friars **Reading:** Rona Goffen, "Masaccio's *Trinity* and the Early Renaissance" *Masaccio's Trinity* 1-26.

Day 4: Franciscan Foundations and the art of Giotto

Morning Drawing session: Professor Jen Maloney will lead a drawing session in Piazza della Signoria.

Afternoon Site visit: Santa Croce

Intensive study of the frescoes of Giotto and other Trecento fresco cycles Both the context and history of the frescoes and the technique of painting fresco will be explored.

Morning visit: Bargello Museum of Sculpture.

Special lecture on the sculpture of Donatello, Brunelleschi and Michelangelo.

Afternoon Drawing Session: Perspective with Prof. Maloney

Duomo, with a chance to climb to the top of the dome!

Afternoon site visit: The Medici Palace **Reading:** "Florence: The Medici and Political Propaganda" from *Art, Power, and Patronage in Renaissance Italy* 251-288

Day 10: Excursion to Siena and San Gimignano

Day 11: The Last Supper--Multiple Perspectives

Morning site visit: We will view four different Last Supper paintings around the city, including works by Andrea del Castagno, Perugino and Andrea del Sarto **Dinner and Party at an Italian home in the suburbs of Florence**

Day 12: The Art of Fra Angelico

Morning site visit: San Marco Afternoon: Free

Days 13-14: Saturday and Sunday, free travel days

Day 15: Art Across the Arno: Masaccio and Brunelleschi

Morning site visit: Masaccio's Brancacci Chapel Frescoes in Santa Maria del Carmine and Santo Spirito Afternoon site visit: San Lorenzo
